Household waste recycling centres set for refresh in November



Read the story on the Oxfordshire County Council website or below:

People planning to use Oxfordshire's household waste recycling centres (HWRCs) next month are being warned about a series of short closures to enable essential work to be carried out.

For safety reasons, Oxfordshire County Council will be shutting each of its centres for two days – although never at the same time – to allow for deep cleaning and essential maintenance to take place. This includes jet washing the sites and structures, repainting lines and safety areas, as well as other general work to improve the customer experience.

The closing dates are:

- · Alkerton, near Banbury: Tuesday 2 and Wednesday 3 November
- Ardley, near Bicester: Thursday 4 and Friday 5 November
- Dix Pit, Stanton Harcourt: Tuesday 23 and Wednesday 24 November
- Drayton, near Abingdon: Tuesday 9 and Wednesday 10 November
- Oakley Wood, near Wallingford: Tuesday 16 and Wednesday 17 November
- · Redbridge, Oxford: Thursday 18 and Friday 19 November
- Stanford, near Farringdon: Thursday 11 and Friday 12 November.

All closures are on quieter weekdays to minimise disruption, and sites will reopen at 8am the following day. Residents are asked to plan ahead, ideally holding on to their waste until the site reopens or, if that is not possible, visiting one of the neighbouring sites.

More information can be found on the Oxfordshire County Council <u>website</u>, including details of your nearest alternative site during the closures.

Residents with van or trailer permits can use these at any of the HWRCs.

Christmas Greetings

Richmond Walkway Repair



Our intention is to replace the existing wooden walkway with a stone path following, As much as possible, the same line as the existing walkway, allowing for surface slope and contour. The start and end points will be the same as the current location, and we may change the gate at the nature reserve end to improve access. We will be using a honeycomb type construction method to minimise affect on tree roots and earth bank. Subject to planning approval (currently in decision phase) and availability of contractors and materials, we hope to have the path fully open for residents and public use by the end of December. To clarify, the path is a permissive path, not a public right-of-way.

St Andrew's

ovember is an important month for St Andrew's. Our saint's feast day is on the 30th and during the last weekend in November there are various events to honour St Andrew. On Saturday 27th there will be a

Gift Day when villagers, whether churchgoers or not, are invited to call into church in the morning and make a donation for the upkeep of our beautiful and historic church. A letter will be going out with further details, so please look out for this.

It is also a tradition to give the churchyard some TLC. Christine Birch has taken on the task of coordinating this and she writes:

Anne Williams has been busy all year in the churchyard and her husband, Gavin, will work on the compost heap this month. Fallen branches and twigs have been removed whilst leaving selected piles to act as 'bug hotels'. As in the past, assistance would be appreciated at **St. Andrew's Churchyard clear-up** on **Saturday 27th November between 10:00 – 12:00noon**. Leaves will be collected plus grass and weeds cut from close to the memorial stones i.e. beyond the reach of the mower, and all added to the compost heap. Anyone who is available to help for an hour or so with this task would be most welcome. Please bring gardening gloves and any suitable tools such as a wheelbarrow, garden broom, rake, secateurs and/or hand shears and observe physical distancing from anyone not in your household. Refreshments will be available in the church.

The last weekend in November is always significant for St Andrew's but especially so this year as it marks the retirement of our rector, Leonora. She has ministered not just to St Andrew's but to all the Ridgeway churches, all six of them, on joyful occasions and in sad times, coping with covid restrictions and seeking to navigate a way forward. We hope that she may be able to be present in church for part of the Gift Day and would, I'm sure, love to have villagers pop in to wish her well.

There will be events at Sparsholt that weekend to mark Leonora's retirement – please see *Signpost* for further details.

November 28th is the end of the church's old year and the beginning of the new. There will be a service for Advent Sunday at St Andrew's at 10am that morning. (This year's crop of Advent calendars seems to contain more inappropriately themed calendars than ever. There's even a Pork Crackling Advent Calendar with pork scratching for each day of Advent. Our Lord would have loved that.) St Andrew's service will be more traditional.

Looking ahead, there will be an Advent Quiet Day on December 8th at Wantage Convent and a special Advent Evening on December 22nd. More details next month and in *Signpost*.

St Andrew asked to be crucified on a diagonal cross, saying that he wasn't worthy to die on the same shaped cross as Jesus. This cross, or saltire, is said to have appeared in the sky before a bloody battle at Athelstaneford in 832AD. We wish you a rather more peaceful St Andrew's Day.

Letcombes Gardening Club

Topical Tips

e're well into autumn now and I'm sure many of you are already busy clearing away all those leaves.

What fun!

We have had a pretty mild October so you may well, like me, have taken advantage of this and left some of your tender plants outside to enjoy the display for a while longer. However I think we'll all be pushing our luck rather as we enter November and so those tender plants need to be brought into the greenhouse. If you do decide to leave some of your pots outside then you may want to raise them up onto pot feet (bricks will also do the job although I suppose they don't look so aesthetically pleasing) to prevent waterlogging.

I think I say this every year but it's a good idea to clip a third off the top of your roses to prevent wind rock.

You may think you've got away without planting bulbs this year, or 'missed the boat' as it were, but November is actually the ideal month to plant tulips so get out those catalogues and put your order in quickly. Stocks are running low!

You can still lift and divide perennials and also lift your cannas and dahlias once they have been hit by the first frost. Remember to label them! The number of years I've had to grow many of my dahlias on in pots until they've starting flowering purely because I've forgotten to do this. The leaves all look remarkably the same I find!!

You shouldn't feed any of your plants now but mulching is still permitted and is essential for borderline hardy plants.

You can still plant containerised trees and shrubs now and it's also a good time of year to move them so if you have a shrub in the wrong location and it's been annoying you all year then get out there and shift it.

On the fruit and veg front the most important thing to do is protect your brassicas with netting! We have a good number of big fat pigeons in the village and they will love to feast on your sprouts and purple sprouting etc. if they can get at them. Such an easy meal!

If you have empty areas of your veg patch then do cover them. This will save a huge amount of weeding at the beginning of next season and will also warm the soil a bit thus giving your crops a bit of a head start.

You should be harvesting cabbage, sprouts, kale, leeks and parsnips through winter. Parsnips are best left until after the first frost as they will be sweeter then.

Well I think that's it for now. There's plenty more that you can be getting on with but I don't want to put you off. Enjoy!

These include restoring 30% of land and sea for Nature by 2030 and 100% of upland peat before 2050; introducing a new 'Wildbelt' designation into the English planning system to protect land in recovery; introducing a legally binding and funded 'State of Nature' target into England's Environmental Bill; using England's new Environmental Land Management schemes to support and incentivise sustainable land use practices; and designating 30% of all Marine Protected Areas as Highly Protected with appropriate policies and planning to contribute to enhancing blue carbon stores. ovember 2021 is a momentous month: COP26 was postponed from 2020 and will be

hosted by the UK in Glasgow in partnership with Italy which hosted the pre-COP preparatory meeting in Milan in October. 'COP' (Conference of the Parties) is the annual meeting, since the 1995 COP1 in Berlin, of governments signed up to the UN Framework Convention of Climate Change (UNFCCC) to discuss how to address climate change jointly. As well as world leaders. ministers, negotiators, COPs are attended by



representatives from civil society, business, international organizations, and the media.

Almost all countries signed up to an international treaty, The Paris Agreement, after COP21 in Paris in 2015. This treaty aims to keep the rise in the global average temperature to 'well below' 2 degrees above pre-industrial levels, ideally 1.5 degrees; to strengthen the ability to adapt to climate change and build resilience; and to align all finance flows with 'a pathway towards low greenhouse gas emissions and climate-resilient development'. Each signatory country decides by how much they will reduce their emissions by a certain date and targets are communicated to the UNFCCC in the form of 'nationally determined contributions' (NDCs). The signatories are expected to submit new and more ambitious NDCs every five years, as a 'ratchet mechanism'.

To have a chance of limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees, global greenhouse gas emissions must halve by 2030 and reach 'net-zero' by 2050. These goals will not be achieved by the 2015 NDCs so one of the main 'benchmarks for success' in COP26 is that as many governments as possible submit new NDCs which, when put together, are ambitious enough to put the world on track for 'well below' 2 degrees. The 2021 Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change latest report published in August 2021 (Climate change widespread, rapid, and intensifying – IPCC — IPCC) emphasises that it is still possible to achieve the 1.5 degree target, but *only* if unprecedented action is taken now. This the last decade for action.

With five days to COP26, 116 out of 192 signatories have submitted new or updated NDCs: the UK has pledged to reduce emissions by 68% by 2030 compared to 1990 levels, and 78% by 2035; the EU target is for a reduction of at least 55% by 2030 relative to 1990 levels; and the US target is a reduction of 50-52% compared to 2005 levels. However, the NDC updates only narrow the gap to 1.5 degrees by 15% at most and data released by the UN World Meteorological Organization on 25 October shows that all the key greenhouse gases rose faster in 2020 than the average rate for the previous decade and this trend has continued into 2021 (WMO Greenhouse Gas Bulletin (GHG Bulletin) - No.17 | E-Library). Carbon dioxide emissions, mainly from fossil fuel use, fell slightly in 2020 compared to 2019, but the Covid economic slowdown did not have any discernible lasting impact on overall atmospheric levels of greenhouse gases, which include methane and nitrous oxide, or their growth rate which quickly increased again beyond 2019 levels and are now at their highest on our planet for 3 to 5 million years with the global emissions rate estimated by the UN to rise by 16% by 2030.

The planet has been hotter and sea levels higher in the geological past but there were not 7.8 billion people living on Earth then. Our responsibility as a developed country to finance climate action in developing countries was recognised by Boris Johnson in September, 'We started this industrial revolution in Britain: we were the first to send the great puffs of acrid smoke to the heavens on a scale to derange the natural order.... We understand when the developing world looks to us to help them...' (PM speech at the UN General Assembly: 22 September 2021 - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)). In 2009 the developed countries promised \$100 billion per year by 2020 to support climate action in developing countries. Although official figures will not be available until 2022, it is clear that figure was not met by last year and more mobilisation of finance will be needed on top of the recent announcement from the US to increase its contribution.

Another important element of COP26 is the ability of countries to adapt to climate change impacts including economic and non-economic harms which cannot be avoided through adaptation or mitigation. These impacts are complex and wide-ranging across the natural physical world, wildlife and human populations. The Climate change risk assessment 2021 published by Chatham House in September 2021 (Climate change risk assessment 2021 | Chatham House — International Affairs Think Tank) is a detailed discussion on water, food and migration amongst other impacts.

Whilst historical emissions are important, almost 66% of the emissions of fossil carbon dioxide in our atmosphere have occurred since 1980 and 40% since 2000; it is current and future emissions that are in governments' control now. Comparisons depend on the parameters chosen but the UK is in the top 10 countries for cumulative emissions 1850-2021 whether or not population size is factored in. Recent reassessments of changed land use including rainforest deforestation and fires (Analysis: Which countries are historically responsible for climate change? - Carbon Brief) has placed Brazil and Indonesia in the cumulative top 10 emitters if population size is not considered; the Amazon Basin is no longer a net absorber of carbon dioxide.

Many scientists think COP26 decisions will determine whether future generations see this month as when we finally came to our collective senses and took action – or as the last, missed chance. To reach 'Net Zero Carbon' by 2050, Green technologies must come on stream at an even faster rate. The limits on the remaining time, financial capital, and human capacity constrain what can be achieved in the next 29 years. A recent comment from **Professor Neil Harris**, **of Cranfield University and the Royal Meterological Society**, **is germane**, 'If a technology is going to take 10 years to develop, 10 years to make into an economically viable, large-scale equivalent and 10 years to roll out at global level, it will make very little contribution to the Net Carbon Zero Target in 2050 regardless of how much difference it makes after that. If it absorbs huge amounts of financial or human capital, is it the best option to promote now? *Large reductions are required now if we are to stay on track, so resources have to be deployed now*'. David Attenborough is hopeful about COP26 because the 'unparalleled' severity of the problems are shared by all nations and media technology means people globally can see the impacts of climate change, so it is to all nations' advantage to agree to take action in a unified way. For younger generation's sake, we must hope his optimism is well-founded.
