Thank you to all those who attended our recent Parish Council Meeting (20/9/21), via Zoom. The PC has unanimously agreed to continue, through the winter months, using this virtual platform, and review again in the spring. All members of the Parish Council are happy to be contacted, and the Parish Website displays our details. Also the Parish Clerk is available via the internet, <a href="letregispc@gmail.com">letregispc@gmail.com</a>, or you can phone and leave a message 07491000305.

We were pleased to welcome Mr Ian Robertson, the new Manager from Richmond to the meeting, we are both keen to strengthen the links between Richmond and the village. One potential project will be the Platinum Jubilee celebrations next June (2022). More details will be revealed in the coming months.

There are a number of initiatives being introduced locally, and in particular – Civil Parking Enforcement in the Vale, which will commence in November. Please be sure to park in designated places or you may well end up with a fine.

Elsewhere in the Register you will find a very helpful article on Scams and Phishing. We are grateful to our PCSO for providing this very useful update. Do take the time to read it, as it is even more important with today's reliance on the internet to keep yourself safe.

There is much discussion currently regarding initiatives and deals purporting to offer faster internet packages, and Cllr. Paul Batchelor has written a useful article to explain what we understand is happening. The PC continues to work with our District Councillor, Paul Barrow, and other Parish Councils, to ensure our voice is heard.

Following the circulation on the Village Email concerning the County Council's review of Recycling Centres, we hope that you have all taken the time to respond. The continued availability of the Stanford Tip is vital to keep our environment free from fly tipping and illegal rubbish dumping. We will communicate the outcome as soon as it is known.

Some good news this week, the Green Waste collection will resume, with some variations to the original scheme – details were circulated to the Village Email list. If you have not yet given your details to the Parish Clerk, please do so as soon as possible, as the Village Email is an excellent means of providing you with urgent information. You can be assured that your email will only be used for this purpose and will not be shared.

The Burial Ground improvements are well underway, and as well as improved access from the Recreation Ground side, better parking, including disabled parking bays, a new Lych Gate is to be erected to afford some shelter on bad weather days. The improvements will mean that there are enough plots for many generations to come, especially as the Church Graveyard at the corner of Bassett Road is also available for burials.

The PC was pleased to receive a request for a grant to support the Village Fireworks which is planned to take place on 6 November. The Village Hall & Recreation Ground Trust are planning to open the Pavilion with food and drinks available so please look out for details. This is always a very popular village event, not to be missed.

Finally, the latest information on Health Provision locally is that the Wantage Hospital will definitely reopen for out patients and other functions but decisions about in patient beds remain to be taken. In addition a plan has been submitted to the Vale to expand the Mably Way Health Centre. This is at the consultation stage so please make your views known via the Vale of the White Horse Planning website.

# Phishing, Smishing and Vishing

### What it is

Any website, online service, phone call or text message that poses as a company or brand you recognise.

Any contact like this is designed to convince you to hand over valuable personal details or your money, or download something that infects your computer.

The three terms are all plays on the word 'fishing', in that the fraudsters fish for potential victims by sending emails, social media messages or text messages or making phone calls with urgent messages in the hope of persuading someone to visit the bogus website

**Phishing** is a method employed by Fraudsters to try and obtain personal details such as user names and passwords. Phishing is carried out by sending spoof e-mails or instant messaging. Often the e-mail will look like it is genuine and will contain links that take victims to a website that looks identical to the genuine web site. Victims will then attempt to log into the site and in so doing will disclose their username and password. The fraudster then uses the log in details to commit fraud.

**Smishing** is when fraudsters obtain personal details of a victim by SMS text messages. SMS phishing uses phone text messages to deliver the bait to induce people to divulge their personal information. Fraudsters can go on to use this personal information to commit fraud.

**Vishing** is when fraudsters obtain personal details of a victim by phone.

### What to look out for and what you should do if you receive a phishing message

- Be aware and pro-active: When responding to emails or phone calls, never give your login or personal details. If you receive an email from a company that claims to be legitimate but is requesting these details, or a contact number tell them you will call them back. Use a contact number for the organisation that you have sourced reputably. Speak to them directly to confirm that the message is genuine
- **Use your spam filter**: If you detect a phishing email, mark the message as spam and delete it. This ensures that the message cannot reach your inbox in future
- Know your source: Never respond to a message from an unknown source. Take care not to click any embedded links. Phishing emails are sent to a vast number of randomly generated addresses. However, clicking embedded links can provide verification of your active email address. Once this occurs it may facilitate the targeting of further malicious emails. Even "unsubscribe" links can be malicious. Ensure that the email is from a trusted source and you are, in fact, subscribed to the service.

# Friends of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve

utumn is the season of plentiful berries in the Reserve. In late summer, each elderflower formed a berry, in the true botanical definition of a fleshy fruit containing seeds produced from the ovary of a single flower. These will be used as a food source this month by a variety of birds, butterflies and mammals such as squirrels and deer.



The berries (left) are rich in sugars and are easily pulled off their slender stalks making them attractive to small migratory warblers, blackcaps and whitethroats, as well as larger blackbirds and woodpigeons. Insects are drawn to the bruised fruit providing a feast for insectivores. Elderberries are closely followed by blackberries, not actually true berries in the botanical sense, which also are non-toxic and only stay at their best for a short period before toxic moulds grow on them in damper conditions. Late butterflies feed on blackberries for the sweet juices, as do squirrels and badgers. Fruit with longer preservation periods are left untouched by birds until other food

sources are scarce, and those with mild toxicity, like ivy, are only consumed in low numbers at any one sitting. In this way, the supply of berries for wildlife will last long into the winter.

The deep red berries (left with ivy berries) of Hawthorn are particularly plentiful this year and will feed more than



300 species of insect. Hawthorn berries support many birds including thrushes and migratory redwings and fieldfares, whilst the sharp thorns give security to groups of smaller birds in the bushes such as Long-tailed tits (*Aegithalos cadatus*). The larger blue-black sloes (right) of Blackthorn (*Prunus spinose*) are too big for small songbirds

but are of value to insects and larger birds, such as thrushes and hawfinches, the latter eating the hard seed as well as the flesh. The dusty blue colouration that these fruits develop is a yeast bloom which enhances ultraviolet light reflection coincidentally making them stand out more to



birds with their UV vision enabling them to perceive colour contrasts which are invisible

to people. The berries of the Spindle tree (*Euonymus europaea*) look more exotic with their vibrant pink fruits containing bright orange seeds (right). They are a valuable food for bird, mice



and foxes but, though attractive visually to people, both leaves and berries are toxic to humans. The Guelder rose (Viburnum opulus) has bunches of translucent, vivid red berries (left) that are an important food source for birds, including bullfinches and mistle thrushes, but is another bush with berries toxic to



humans. The bright red, oval berries of the Dog rose will be eaten by larger birds like blackbirds, redwings, fieldfares and, if any hips are left later in the

year, by waxwings. All these are a small selection of the berries sustaining wildlife in the Reserve.

Monthly work parties will continue on the third Saturday of each month, the next one is on 16 October between 13:30 and 16:30. Please meet near the pond notice board on the Community Reserve by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. As you are aware, extra caution is still advisable, so please bring your own work gloves, mask, drink, and snack if you plan to join the work party. # The Letcombes Conservation Group

ost people will be aware of the association between the late Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, and the World Wildlife Fund, founded in 1961, now renamed the World Wilde Fund for Nature, and 60 years later



the world's leading non-governmental conservation organisation with a mission to create a world in which people and wildlife can thrive together. The advantage of global travel, at a time when this was the exception rather than the norm for holidays, convinced Prince Philip of the urgency of wilderness preservation and for a fund-raising organisation to support the work of existing conservation groups. However, the organisation soon evolved into running its own projects with scientists focussed on 'ecoregions' in the areas of forest, freshwater and marine habitat conservation, endangered species conservation, climate change, and the elimination of the toxic chemicals across many countries.

Another of the founders, Sir Peter Scott, famously stated, 'We shall not save all we should like to, but we shall save a great deal more than if we had never tried'.

It is not surprising, therefore, that to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 a tree planting initiative has been created named The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC). Everyone across the UK is invited to plant trees from this

month until March 2022, the ideal tree planting season, though any tree planted through to the end of the Jubilee year of 2022 can be part of the QGC. Rather than concentrating on a few civic trees, the QGC aims to create a network of individual trees, avenues, copses and whole woodlands in honour of The Queen's service and the legacy she has built. Every tree planted that reaches maturity will make a difference bringing benefits to wildlife, people and climate in the short term and creating a green legacy for the future.



A fantastic diversity of wildlife are supported by trees, in the case of British oak trees an estimated 2,300 species. Green spaces in the UK remove up to 1.3 billion kg of pollutants from the air each year creating a healthier environment. Each mature tree is estimated to absorb up to 150kg of CO2 each year; though some of the gas is returned via photosynthesis, a proportion of the carbon is fixed in the tree tissue as it grows. In urban localities the air temperature can be cooled by 2 to 8 degrees by well-placed trees providing shade.

Suitable trees need to be chosen with the locality in mind and have the best chance of flourishing if they are native and sustainable in those conditions. They should be planted when the roots are dormant if purchased bare-rooted, though container-grown trees will establish before the tree is dormant for the winter or after April in suitable conditions. Advice is available online from a dedicated website for the initiative at <a href="The Queen's Green Canopy">The Queen's Green Canopy</a> and on planting from the RHS or the Woodland Trust at <a href="Trees and shrubs: planting">Trees and shrubs: planting</a> / RHS Gardening and <a href="How to Plant Trees - Woodland Trust">How to Plant Trees - Woodland Trust</a>. Each tree planted from October can be added to a national map on the QGC website whether planted by an individual, a community group, a school or organisation. In addition, the initiative will dedicate a network of 70 Ancient Woodlands across the UK and identify 70 Ancient Trees to celebrate Her Majesty's 70 years of service. So this autumn and winter make a difference for the future, <a href="Plant a Tree for the Jubilee">Plant a Tree for the Jubilee</a>.





# Developing The Fibre Optic Cable Communications in Letcombe Regis

The previous issue of the Register contained an article on the current status of the development of the ultrafast fibre optic broadband cable developments in the village. Since its publication the Parish Council have been working with other parishes and the County Council to try and ensure that Letcombe Regis and the surrounding areas are able to benefit from schemes as they evolve. One aspect of this work is to keep residents informed of developments and the issues that they will face as the possible new arrangements begin to appear. This will help ensure that people can make an informed decision as to which is the most appropriate arrangement to meet their needs.

This article will outline the context of the fibre optic cable developments along with the proposed timetable. It is divided into three further sections: why the change to fibre optic systems; what exactly is involved, and; how arrangements are currently progressing. Depending on what residents would like information on, the Parish Council will follow up in subsequent articles how matters are progressing and what steps residents need to take if they wish to have access to what is termed 'ultrafast' broadband.

### What exactly is changing and why?

For telecommunications we have relied on a copper wire based system for over a 100 years. The arrangements through which both communications and broadband services using analogue and digital technologies are managed is by BT Openreach, an independent division of British Telecommunications. They are responsible for the copper wires, fibre cables and other elements of the infrastructure which connects homes to local exchanges.

There are three types of connections possible using the current infrastructure. These are: Public Switched Telephone Network (PSTN), the copper wire based system used for voice communication; Asymmetric Digital Subscriber Line (ADSL), which uses the copper wire based system but, with some additional equipment, allows internet access as well as voice communication, and; Integrated Services Digital Network (ISDN), which, while also using copper wire allows transmission using digital not analogue signals.

BT Openreach have announced that they are 'closing' the copper wire based arrangements by 2026. This does not mean that all premises will have to be converted to a fibre optic system, simply that any new arrangements will be based around a fibre optic cable system and the existing ADSL and ISDN lines would be replaced.

There are a considerable number of advantages to the move including:

- (i) Durability and reliability. The copper wire based system is more prone to breakage and hence require greater maintenance than the equivalent fibreoptic (glass) system. In countries which have already seen a switch data suggest that there up to 70% fewer faults.
- (ii) Speed. The maximum speed that copper wire can transmit data is around 50Mbps (Megabytes per second). This may sound like a huge capacity but with the growth in internet usage, for example downloading of material and video linking, it is currently barely adequate to meet demand. Indeed, as a household increases the number of users the speed of transmission drops considerably. Fibreoptic cabling arrangements will allow speeds of up to 1000Mbs.
- (iii) Size. Fibreoptic cabling is far smaller in diameter than copper wire. This will allow more cabling to be installed into the existing conduits used for copper wire and hence less disruption as demand for services increases.
- (iv) Consistency. Fibre broadband is more resistant to 'line drops' when the service disappears for brief periods. While such drops are not too challenging for simple web-browsing it is more irksome for watching video and TV online (which is rapidly becoming the norm) and the inevitable working-from-home video calls.
- (v) Property prices. Surveys and research show that buyers are now prepared to pay more for homes with fibre broadband. The recent COVID lockdowns have shown the importance of reliable, durable, speedy and consistent broadband for working from home and spending more time watching online entertainment. With the requirement for all new builds to have fibre broadband and the sheer number of new builds in and around Wantage, it is clear that, even if we might not appreciate a fibre broadband connection, potential buyers of our homes will look elsewhere if we do not have it.
- (vi) Cost. As fibre broadband is rolled out, any cost differential to the existing copper connections is being competed away. Having the ability to connect to fibre does not mean you need to pay for the fastest service.

In summary, the move to fibreoptic cabling is a national programme which will see a number of improvements over existing arrangements. It would meet the increased demand better, not least with greater reliance on working from home, and in theory provide cheaper services when compared to maintaining the copper wire based arrangements.

#### What exactly is involved?

At present Letcombe Regis is served by a combined fibreoptic cable and copper based arrangement. There is cabling into the village from the main exchange at Wantage (the cabinet is situated at the bottom of Court Hill Road) and from there, copper wire is used to connect each household. This arrangement is known as Fibre To The Cabinet (FFTC). Under the proposed developments this will be altered to Fibre To The Premises (FTTP), which will see the fibreoptic cabling throughout the system.

During the changeover some disruption will occur, although the extent of this is unclear until the company awarded the contract to undertake the work has carried out its survey. Ideally, the existing conduits will be able to carry the cabling and the present telegraph poles will be used. However, any changes to the conduit arrangements may mean roadworks and work on the telegraph pole arrangements will no doubt be required.

In addition, current phone systems that use copper wire based arrangements will not work with those using fibre optic cabling. This issue will be covered in a later article as the proposals for the new arrangements are firmed up.

### Progress of current arrangements.

The time schedule for the changes covering Letcombe Regis can be found on the BT OpenReach website (see: <a href="https://www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband/where-when-building-ultrafast-full-fibre-broadband">https://www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband/where-when-building-ultrafast-full-fibre-broadband</a>). The move is scheduled to be completed by April 2025. However, at present the contractor to supply the infrastructure has yet to be appointed, indeed Airband's letter that was referred to in last month's article in the Register is I would argue more about it trying to gauge the size of its potential customer base than actually providing a service.

While a cable has been installed by Airband on Warborough Road, the funding from this was supported as part of the rural business development scheme, (mis) managed by the Department of the Environment. Airband at the time stated that the cable could not be extended to support the village and an alternative routing would be required.

It is hoped that the contractor for the cabling infrastructure will be appointed within the next few months. Working with other parishes and the County Council we are trying to ensure that developments go as smoothly and as cheaply as possible. This is heavily dependent upon the numbers of households which feel that adopting the FTTP system best meets both their current but especially future needs.

As mentioned previously this is the first of a proposed series of articles to help inform and reassure people. ## **Letcombes Gardening Club**

## **Topical Tips**

Forgive me for thinking that we are just entering September but this last month has been so glorious that it's been more like summer!

There are lots to look forward to this month though, despite the prospect of less warmth and sun. The leaves will be changing colour and this is always a feast for the eyes.

There are, however, some jobs that need to be done so we can't just sit and look! You can lift and divide perennials this month; it isn't a job that is just confined to spring. It's a good time to do this because not only is the soil nice and warm but you can still see the plants whereas in spring you have to rely more on what you remember from the previous year!

You can trim back perennials but don't be too enthusiastic about this, as some seed heads look really attractive covered in frost.

Don't be too hasty about lifting dahlia tubers, as you need the frost to blacken the top growth first. You can lift tender bulbs now though and you also need to keep a watch on the weather and move tender perennials inside before the first frosts.

Many plants get killed off from waterlogging rather than cold and this applies to plants in pots too so raise the pots on pot feet to prevent this happening.

Lets move on to trees and shrubs. It's your last chance to prune deciduous hedges now. You can also trim to halfway those shrubs that you usually cut right back in spring to prevent wind rock.

October is also a good time to plant and move trees and shrubs.

Why not try some more advanced propagation? Have a go at hardwood cuttings. This works with roses. You can also collect berries, like rowan, and have a go at sowing them.

Lets spare a thought for our houseplants. As the days shorten you should reduce watering and if any are tropical it pays to stand them on beds of gravel so you can keep the humidity up when the central heating goes on.

Now lets finish off with fruit and veg and I have to quote a passage I found on the web about October as it really tickled my fancy!

'October is usually a month full of chilly mornings and spooky nights – the kind of weather that puts you in mind of hot mugs of tea, bowls of soup and if you're an allotment gardener, lots of lovely winter digging!'

It says it all really! Keep on harvesting and make sure you lift any crops that are likely to be damaged by frost.

You can sow winter lettuce and also winter hardy peas and broad beans so that you get an early crop next year.

It is also a good time to lift and divide rhubarb crowns (lots for friends) and to plant new crowns.

Make sure you stake your sprouts and purple sprouting otherwise they will all end up horizontal with the autumn winds! Other than that we're talking about tidying up for the winter.

So get out into the garden and enjoy that autumn colour!

Whilst looking at the document and thinking of your comments you might want to remember that Community Health is generally regarded as involving all health provision other than acute hospitals and GP surgeries.

Issues which give us some concern on HOSC include:

- 1. How the care sector is to be integrated adequately.
- 2. Palliative care provision.
- 3. The influence of budget constraints and workforce difficulties because the aims are laudable but what can be done might be more limited.
- 4. The Home First policy which is, where possible, to discharge patients home rather than to a community hospital because they generally recover faster.
- 5. How the community health provision will fit in with the Integrated Care System across Bucks-Oxon-West Berks (BOB ICS) where an increasing number of services are likely to be covered across county borders. This may not affect community health but we do not know so far.
- 6. Rural accessibility to health services.
- 7. Increasing demand on mental health services.

Please be wary of the questionnaire and where necessary be a critical friend. I am always worried where questions are posed where the answers are likely to be yes!
