Have your say on how to improve Oxfordshire's bus services

Read the story on the Oxfordshire County Council website or below:

People who visit, live or work in Oxfordshire are urged to have their say on the county's bus network and services.

Oxfordshire County Council has started a consultation process to find out people's views on the service that is provided now and what people would like to see in the future. People can have their say by visiting Let's Talk Oxfordshire, the council's new digital consultation and engagement platform.

The results will help the council agree a Bus Service Improvement Plan with bus operator partners to send to the government this October, which will help unlock funding to improve Oxfordshire's bus services.

To meet this challenge, Oxfordshire County Council is working with local bus companies to create the Bus Service Improvement Plan. This will involve developing bold plans for improving Oxfordshire's bus services and encouraging more people to use them.

The government has pledged £3 billion nationwide to help deliver these plans, and Oxfordshire is aiming to secure as much of this funding as it can. The survey is open until Monday 13 September.

Topical Tips

I hope you have all been enjoying the summer despite the rather dull, indifferent weather we've been having, and that you have maybe managed to get away for a bit. It looks like the weather is brightening up so we can look forward to some lovely golden early autumn days in the garden.

Lets start with the ornamental garden, where you'll be relieved to hear that there isn't quite so much to do at the moment.

You can lift and divide perennials now so if you have a clump that has been taking over and has been annoying you then feel free to start attacking it! Crocosmia is a good candidate for this because as the clump gets larger and more congested it tends to stop flowering.

You can also think ahead to next season and collect seed and plant spring bulbs.

Keep up with the deadheading. For plants such as dahlias this will mean you will continue to get more flowers to brighten up the autumn border.

You can give evergreen hedges a last trim now. The shape to aim for is slightly narrower at the top than the bottom as this helps to prevent snow from damaging the hedge and also stops the top from shading out the bottom, which can lead to dead patches.

Just a word of warning. Honey fungus fruiting bodies appear in late September. Don't be overly alarmed though as lots of other, harmless, fungi appear at time of year. Any that appear in open lawn or on mulch are not likely to be honey fungus.

If you have a pond then you can cut back marginal plants now. No more than 50% of the surface area should be covered. Netting can help to stop leaves falling into the water if you have trees around.

Now for fruit and veg. September is a busy harvesting month. Potatoes and onions should be dug up now and certainly before any cold weather arrives.

Apples and pears should also become ready to pick and there will still be autumn fruiting raspberries to gather.

You can still sow oriental vegetables as they will be hardy enough to withstand the cold so have a go at some pak choi; lovely with your oriental stir-fry!

September is a good time to reflect on which crops have done well and which have struggled. Make a note of this before you forget so you can plan ahead for a successful season next year!

All that remains is for me to encourage you to get out into the garden and enjoy the last of the warm weather!

Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) Network

Many of you will have received correspondence from Airband explaining about their work concerning the installation of fibre optic cabling to enable higher internet speeds. The current work in Letcombe Regis was in part funded through a Government grant designed to aid the development of rural businesses and not for residential properties. Indeed, the present cabling installation by Airband is only covering selected properties on Warborough Road.

The Parish Council had engaged with Airband to explore the possibility of adding a residential network but progress has been hampered not least by the pandemic. The cost of the installation was heavily dependent on the number of subscribers; the more households that signed up, the lower the installation costs. Signing up to Airband however only provides you with the infrastructure and any services you wish to subscribe to, for example Sky, would incur additional charges. Furthermore, Airband does not have agreements in place with all service supply companies, included among these is British Telecom.

The Government has since announced a new scheme to help defray the costs of installation in rural areas but this time covers residential properties. However, the sums are not only relatively small but the regulations on which areas would qualify complex. Letcombe Regis had been designated an area which would not qualify for any subsidies but the Parish Council along with other Parish Councils in the Ridgeway and our District Councillor, Paul Barrow are working with the County Council to challenge this. We are hopeful that we will be able to access funds to defray some of the installation costs.

In addition, the regulations of the new scheme have allowed alternative infrastructure companies to bid to undertake the work. This includes OpenReach who have fewer limits on which supply companies they will grant access to their network. We will keep parishioners updated on this important matter but for now would not recommend signing up to a FTTP contract. Friends of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve

onthly work parties will continue on the third Saturday of each month, the next one is on 18 September between 13:30 and 16:30. Please meet near the pond notice board on the Community Reserve by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. As you are aware, extra caution is still advisable, so please bring your own work gloves, mask, drink, and snack if you plan to join the work party. Dragonflies may be seen darting around the pond this month. The aquatic larval stage lasted up to two years in the pond and brook eating tadpoles, mosquitoes, other insect larvae and even fish. After crawling out of the water, the

exoskeleton cracks open to release the adult abdomen and four wings which dry and harden over several hours to days. The small, reddish brown dragonflies are appropriately called Common Darters (right) whilst



the larger dragonflies are probably specimens of the Southern Hawker (left, photo credits: Gillian Taylor).



Dragonflies were some of the first winged insects to evolve around 300 million years ago. Fossils record that early species had large wingspans, as wide as two feet, but on modern species they only reach two to five inches. Nevertheless, dragonflies are some of the fastest flying insects in the world, up to 30mph, including straight up and down or hovering like a helicopter which has been an

inspiration for engineers of robotic flight. Dragonflies catch their prey with their feet whilst flying, aided by their incredible vision that encompasses almost every angle except directly behind. These insects belong to the order Odonata, Greek for 'toothed one', and have serrated teeth used to consume insects. A single dragonfly can eat thirty to hundreds of mosquitoes per day, an example of control in one food chain of the ecosystem. Some adult dragonflies live for only a few weeks but other species survive for up to a year.

Currently the pond has a fine display, that will persist into autumn, of brown flowerheads capped by spires of smaller, male flowers surrounded with long wide, grey-green leaves of 'bulrushes' or the native Greater reedmace, *Typha latifolia*, (*left*). The true native European bulrush is a marginal plant of a totally different species, *Scirpus lacustris*



(right), but confusion has crept into the use of the common name. Possibly this originated from Western Christian depictions of the biblical story of the

discovery of Moses in the rushes in Exodus 2. A tradition, still continued in modern storybooks, of Moses' basket shown amongst bulrushes seems to have started in Victorian Sunday school illustrations. However, if Moses was indeed in a basket and not a wooden ark, it was most likely to have been made from the papyrus, *Cyperus papyrus*, a



native African reed that grows along the Nile in which a basket would be well camouflaged. Variations of the text of Exodus 2:1-10 arise from the Hebrew word, *tebah*, for Moses' 'basket' in being the same word used for 'ark', as in Noah's ark – something for academics to muse upon.



The Letcombes Conservation Group

The Wildlife Trusts and the RHS set up *Wild About Gardens* to encourage the use of gardens to support nature conservation. When was the last time starlings, house sparrows or hedgehogs visited your garden? These wild animals are increasingly under threat in the open countryside so gardens can make a real difference. In this year's Big Garden Birdwatch in January, in which over a million people counted more than 17 million birds, starlings were the third most numerous bird whilst greenfinches and chaffinches featured amongst the lowest numbers recorded. Nevertheless, sadly, garden visitor numbers do not reflect the wider picture of the overall bird numbers in the UK.

The decline in starling numbers started during the 1980s; the British Trust for Ornithology has recorded a decrease of 66% since the mid-1970s. Data from the Breeding Bird Survey suggests that 33% of



juveniles survived their first year of life in the past, but this has reduced to only 15% now. Starlings are heavily dependent on soil invertebrates, like earthworms, and this food supply may have declined with land-use changes or become less available during dry summers. Starlings spend much of the year in flocks, and judging by the number over Warborough Farm fields in August, the local farming practices suit them well. Due to their overall decline in numbers, the starling is on the Red List of birds of high conservation concern They do, however, eat a wide variety of foods and their glossy plumage with a sheen of purples and

greens can be a welcome addition to garden feeding stations.

Now birds have completed their nesting for the year, garden hedges are being cut back and general tidying is proceeding apace. Spare a thought for one of the most threatened of our indigenous mammal species. Garden pesticides, contaminated water, loss of habitat and increased traffic are thought to be contributory factors to the dramatic fall in UK hedgehog numbers; there are estimated to be now less

than one million wild hedgehogs and they are classified as 'vulnerable to extinction' on the Red List for British mammals. Hedgehogs have a key role in maintaining a healthy ecosystems, controlling insect populations as well as worms, beetles, slugs, caterpillars, earwigs and millipedes that thrive beneath hedges, bushes, and garden vegetation. Though nocturnal, they may be seen in the early evening or night. Strimming poses a particular danger to hedgehogs resting in tall grass, under vegetation, leaf foliage or hedges. Their natural response to noise or other disturbance is to curl up into a ball, protecting their vulnerable belly with their spines. So do check all areas carefully before using a strimmer. Hedgehogs



roam quite widely requiring a network of linked natural spaces including gaps in garden boundaries. Wilder sections of gardens, possibly with log piles, give hedgehogs opportunities for shelter, food and potential nesting sites. Hedgehogs are amazing swimmers, but have poor eyesight and need an easy escape route if they tumble into any pond.
